2012 will be an interesting year for genealogists. We face the ongoing challenge of the fate of the genealogical collection of the Library of Michigan. This continues to be an uncertain issue. Our society needs to remain alert to potential changes and keep members informed.

On the brighter side, the New Year holds lots of promise. An ever growing amount of new resources and records will be available online for genealogical research. Both free and "for fee" websites are constantly releasing records never before available. As the information age rapidly expands, it is an exciting time for genealogists.

One of the more exciting events will be the issuance and availability of the 1940 US Census results. This will happen on April 2, 2012. The census data will be available online, but will not be indexed for some time. Information on this release of data is currently available at: www.archives.gov/research/census/1940/index.html. This website offers shortcuts for finding people, based upon their known address.

During 2012 there will be many training and instructional opportunities for our members. ICGS will continue to offer presentations at our meetings throughout the year. Details on the schedule are provided elsewhere in this newsletter.

Additionally, extensive training opportunities will be available in 2012 at conferences to be held outside Michigan.

- May 9-12, 2012 – National Genealogical Society Conference, Cincinnati, Ohio

PROPOSED ICGS BYLAWS AMENDMENT

TO BE VOTED UPON BY INGHAM COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP AT THE FEBRUARY 9, 2012 MEETING.

PURPOSE: TO PROVIDE FOR APPOINTMENT OF IGCS DELEGATE TO FEDERATION OF GENEALOGICAL SOCIETIES.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE:

ICGS Bylaws, Article IX, Section 5 (by addition)

“The President shall appoint a Historian (to collect and file documents and other material pertaining to the history of the Society), ~~and~~ Michigan Genealogical Council Representatives and Alternates (to attend meetings of the Michigan Council and make reports thereof at the regular meeting of the Society) and a Delegate to the Federation of Genealogical Societies.”

1906 – 1954 INDEXING PROJECT

The Michigan Genealogical Council is once again sponsoring a FamilySearch indexing project. The project is "US, Michigan --Port of Detroit Manifests, 1906-1954. There are 56,662 batches consisting of 849,185 images. The project is considered a "Beginning" level project and is easy to index. There is only one record per image and about 15 images per batch. Unlike the last project, this project has only two or three different forms.

Once again, Roger **Moffat** and Byron **Bailey** will be administrators of the project and are here to assist you if you have questions about this project. Please e-mail <mailto:fsindexing@mimgc.org> to contact them.

The project has only been up since October 28 and they are already making progress. Even though the MGC is sponsoring the project, the project is open for everybody to index. They appreciate all efforts to help complete this project. When completed the images and indexes will be available at FamilySearch.org.

From the Librarian's Corner

Welcome to 2012!! I am hoping that all of you had a very enjoyable Holiday. Family gatherings are a great way to spend time with many family members that you do not see on a regular basis. These are also great opportunities to meet any new family members and to begin collecting the information you will need to add them to your genealogy. The excitement of any new additions to your Family Tree during the last year (or maybe the announcements of any expected additions of a new member to the family in the coming year, whether birth or marriage) always makes the holidays seem brighter. They can also be a great way to find out more information about an ancestor that you have discovered in your research since the last family gathering. Sometimes a request for any information about an ancestor that you have discovered this past year can spark many conversations and stories about this new found family member. Memories and recollections often times range anywhere from very hazy to very vivid. (However, there is always the chance that there are those that will decide not to take part in any of the conversations for a number of reasons.) But, for a genealogist, any information acquired during these celebrations could be considered the best present they receive.

As we continue our tour around the Ingham County Genealogical Society's Reference Room we find several shelves that contain notebooks which provide information on Birth Records, Death Records and Burial Transit Permits. There are also transcriptions for many of the cemeteries in our area. These notebooks provide information for the following Townships and Villages: Alaiedon, Aurelius, Bunkerhill, Delhi, Dansville and Ingham Township, Leroy, Leslie and Leslie Township, Locke, Mason City and Mason area, Meridian, Onondaga, Stockbridge, Vevay, Webberville Village, Wheatfield, White Oak, Williamston City and Williamstown Township, Lansing and East Lansing. All of the information for each township is grouped together and then each township is placed on the shelves alphabetically. So, for example, if you are looking for information about a particular township, you will find the birth records, death records, cemetery information and any other items that pertain to that township all together in one place on the shelf.

There are also records for the Jewett Funeral Home, The Ball Dunn Funeral Home, The Ingham County "Poor Farm" and Burial Transit Permits for the Maple Grove Cemetery. We have a small amount of information for the surrounding counties as well as a Cemetery Atlas that may assist in finding the actual location of a cemetery where a relative is buried.

Have you ever come across information on an ancestor and discovered this information provides a location of where they lived? If so, have you then tried to locate this place on a map and discovered that you are unable to find it? There is a book titled "Michigan Place Names" that provides information about the names of places, how they were named and where they are or were located. Some of these places no longer exist or the location has been changed to a new name. Maybe one of these places is now a ghost town. If so, we have some information available on a few of those places.

We have a cozy corner in the library that has a bookshelf with several books on specific topics pertaining to Michigan and those that helped to form the Great Lakes State. You are welcome to sit in the chair and browse through any of the various offerings available. There are books about logging and trains as well as one titled "Men of Progress of Michigan". "Shopkeepers, Soldiers, Statesmen and One Naked Lady" is a book containing stories of Lansing, Michigan families. There are also books on "New England Marriages prior to 1700" and a set of books titled "The Genealogical Dictionary of the

First Settlers of New England” that may provide some clues to additional family members of those that chose to emigrate from the New England area to Michigan. If you are interested in the history of Ingham County there is a book about that also.

Have you come across a relative that went to school in Mason and might have graduated from Mason High School? We have several years of Mason High School yearbooks available for you to research those family members. As a genealogist, we always enjoy finding pictures of our ancestors that we can add to our Family Tree information. Sometimes the yearbook pictures can be compared to those pictures we have acquired from other family members that do not have any notations as to who they are. As new generations are added to the family, there are always comments about how much the new addition resembles another family member and how many of the family members have inherited a specific family trait through the various generations. Yearbooks also provide some additional information about an individual that may not be available anywhere else.

When you become a member of the Ingham County Genealogical Society, we ask you to complete a Generation Chart. These ancestry charts are recorded and placed in a binder. The information that is provided can be very helpful to other members in our Society that may be researching the same Surname. Sometimes the collaboration with others can provide that piece of information that has been very difficult to find or maybe a link that connects your lineage together on your Family Tree.

Have you checked out the various Family Histories we have on the shelves at our Reference Room? A few years ago, the schools had some of their students complete genealogy projects regarding their own family history. The students did a very good job of researching family members and creating a presentation folder with the information. These projects were then donated to the Reference Room as additions to the many Family Histories that have been donated by various other Genealogists. We encourage everyone to browse through the many different histories to find any link to their own Family History or to possibly donate any Family Histories they have been working on. The presentations range from very simple to very elaborate and it is fun to observe how the information is presented for others to read. These histories are very interesting to read even if they are not related to you. There is so much history available to us as we read through these accounts about the various families. Sometimes any of the historical events that are presented such as epidemics or wars may be exactly what our own ancestors experienced also. They could offer insight into what may have happened within our own Family Tree.

Newspapers are rapidly disappearing all across the country. We are very fortunate to have various newspapers available for you to browse through for news articles about many of your own family members. You might find an announcement about a wedding, a birth announcement or an obituary for an ancestor. There are also tidbits of information about the daily life of your ancestors which could be considered the forerunner of today's Face Book or Twitter accountings. You might also stumble across an article about a gunfight in downtown Mason or the poisoning of a resident and the subsequent arrests of his wife and former hired hand. Some of these newspapers are available on CD's that can be used on our computer and others are available on microfilm that can be viewed on our microfilm reader. Sometimes you can get so lost in reading these old papers that you do not realize how much time has passed. But the time you spend reading through them is always well worth it and very enjoyable.

As you can see, our Reference Room has so much to offer to the beginner genealogist as well as those that are more advanced in their endeavor to find their roots. We owe a debt of gratitude to those Society members that have worked so hard to acquire the information for us and for their tireless effort to preserve the various forms of information for all of us to use as we do our research. Without all of their dedication, we would not have so much valuable information available to us locally.

I am sure that many of us are busy putting important dates on our new 2012 calendars (whether they are electronic or the good old fashioned kind that you hang on the wall.) I would like to encourage all of you to write in a date when you can come and visit the Reference Room which is located on the second floor of the Mason Public Library. We are located through the archway at the back of the room on the second floor. If you are a member of the Ingham County Genealogical Society, you may access the Reference Room whenever the library is open by simply asking for the room key at the front desk of the Library. (We ask that you please remember to return the key when you leave so that others may also have the opportunity to visit). If you are not a member, you may come for a visit on Wednesday afternoon from 12:00 noon to 4:00 p.m. or by contacting the ICGS librarian (through our website) to set up an appointment for a more convenient time. We have had people from all over the country plan a trip to visit our Reference Room. They may find information that leads them to visit other points of interest such as old homesteads or cemeteries while they are in the area.

I would also like to invite you to volunteer to help out at the library on any Wednesday. We enjoy the opportunity to help anyone that comes for a visit to our Reference Room. We also have fun as we search for as much information as we can for any request that is sent to us through our website. Sometimes we even stumble across some information that may help us in our own research. We always learn something new as we share what we have found with each other. Make this the year that you join us for an opportunity to have some fun and to meet some new people that share your interest in genealogy. See you soon!!

Ingham County News, 28 May 1896, Thursday, page 5

Lieut L. B. **Baker** of Lansing died last Sunday forenoon. He was born February 20 1830, and always lived an exemplary life. He had an active and important part in the results of the war of the rebellion. In the detective service he made himself famous by his capture of J. Wilkes **Booth**. Gen **Baker** detailed him with an escort of 25 cavalry men to scour the country about Port Royal. His party was the one which captured the noted assassin, and Lieut. **Baker** was the only assistant of his cousin in the final disposition of the body of **Booth**. He was the first to strike the assassin's trial as he crossed the Rappahannock, to demand his surrender at the barn where he was taken, only person to converse with him before the barn was fired, the first to reach him as he fell pierced by **Corbett's** bullet, and he received the assassin's dying message to his mother and gave him his last drink of water. The story of the pursuit and capture and the final disposition of the body of President **Lincoln's** slayer has been graphically related by Lieut. **Baker** from the lecture platform. At the close of his service with the government, Lieut **Baker** came to Lansing and bought one hundred acres of land where Judge **Person's** residence and the **Terrance** farm are now situated.. This was in 1860. He was soon after employed as a clerk in the auditor general's department and was there almost continuously until his death.

OUR VETERANS

Veterans Day – 11 November 2011

Society Member Lynnette A. (Wright) Castle wishes to acknowledge the men in her family that serviced in the United States Military over past 150 years

- Her husband, **John Edward Castle**, (1927-), in early 1945 was drafted out of high school in his junior year at age eighteen. He was a crew member of M-1 Light Tanks, and served with the mechanized 2nd Calvary in Europe and was stationed at Amberg, Germany in WW-2, held the rank of Pfc
- Her brother, **Keith Edward Wright** (1921-1977), served in the U.S. Army Air Force during WW-2 in the Pacific area on Guam, 315 Bomb Wing and held the rank of sergeant. During the military occupation he played in the 440 Military Band as a trombone player. He served three years, four months
- Her father, **Lynn Avery Wright** (1897-1943), served in the U.S. Army during WW-1 with a machine gun company in the 126th Infantry of the Red Arrow 32nd Division from June 1917 to June 1919 as a Pfc. He received the Purple Heart Ribbon for injuries due to poison gassing during the Battle of Argonne in France in 1918, but remained with the Army of Occupation until his discharge on 23 May 1919
- Her grandfather, Orsemus Franklin Wright (1839-1903), enlisted in the Civil War at Williamston, Massachusetts on July 14, 1862. He was a private in Company E, 37th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment and he served two years ten months, and was wounded twice. His service duties was an ambulance driver, retrieving the wounded and dead from the battle fields. Military files at the National Archives in Washington D.C. reported he deserted June 28, 1863 at Fairfax Station, Virginia, then was arrested on October 23, 1863 by Captain Sheetz and imprisoned in February 1864 at the military prison in Sandusky, Ohio. At trial he was found guilty and was ordered to be shot to death by musketry. Oremus was later cleared of the desertion charges by the Adjutant Generals Office in Washington D.C. the ruling was he was always present on payday. He was mustered out of service on March 13, 1864 and returned to Niagara Falls, New York, had remarried, had three children and died on January 9, 1903

Honor our American Soldiers – Veterans Day – 11 November 2011

John Castle, Society Member wishes to acknowledge the military service of

William Jacob West (1838-1912), born Klingebach, Hessen-Nassau Providence, Ulterlahnkreis County, Germany on 15 June 1838 and baptized on the 21st in the Evangelical Church (source: Parish birth register 1838, Pg 178, Entry 36) He always went by his middle name of Jacob

His parents arrived in the United States on 18 August 1853 at the Port of New York but they had sent him ahead in 1852 to avoid being drafted in the German Army. The family settled in the Village of Jackson, Jackson County, Michigan

1860 Michigan census he is enumerated living in Parma Township, age 22, single and employed by Shepard & Dennis Livery Stables as a blacksmith

Jacob enlisted in the 4th Michigan Calvary, Company I, at Jackson on 11 August 1862 with the rank of Wagoner, later as Wagon Master. He was wounded in the battle at Stones River, near Murfreesboro, Tennessee in December 1863 and was hospitalized at the General Hospital #8, at Nashville. On returning to duty he was promoted to Brigade Blacksmith. He was mustered out of service with his regiment on 1 July 1865 at Nashville

Upon returning to civilian life he owned and operated a blacksmith shop in Summit Township and it was here where his five children were born. The youngest, Martha Catherine West, was my grandmother. In 1870 the family relocated to the City of Jackson and he worked in several factories and the Michigan Central Railroad

On 16 June 1879 he received a military pension, Certificate #254570, of \$8.00 which was later increased to \$15.00. The medical condition was described as varicose veins of his left leg caused by prolonged time spent in the saddle and exposure to the elements

After the death of his wife, Martha Jane (Ferris) West, Jacob entered the Veterans Soldiers Home in Grand Rapids where he lived out his remaining years (source: Application for Admission. Register No. 4216). He died at age 73 on 13 June 1912 and is buried in the Woodlawn Cemetery in Jackson, Michigan, in Section 23, Lot 25. The grave is marked with a C.W. Gravestone.
