## NEWS FROM THE PAST

(typed as written)

Ingham County Democrat, 8 February 1894, page 1

The pupils of the Mason School of Education will give an entertainment at Good Templars Hall, Aurelius Center, Saturday evening, Feb. 10<sup>th</sup>. Among those who will participate are the Misses Maude and Madge **Rhodes**, Frank **Bateman**, Miss Jennie **Clowes**, Miss Allie **Hazelton**, Mrs. G. E. **Sanders**, soloist, and Miss Maude **Bement**, organist. Admission 10 and 15 cents.

Dwight **Blaisdall** is under arrest for breaking a lock and entering a dwelling north-east of Leslie. He pleaded not guilty Wednesday before justice Flansburgh and his trial set for February 12. It is expected that this case will bring to light certain irregularities that are being practiced here that will lead to interesting reading. They will receive attention in due time – Leslie Local

Died at the home of her son, W. H. **Quarry**, in the township of Vevay, Feb. 2d, Mrs Jane **Quarry**, aged 88 years. Mrs. **Quarry** was born in the county of Armah, Ireland, July 5<sup>th</sup>, 1805. She came to this country with husband and family in about the year 1838 and settled in Lucas county, Ohio, where four children of the family were buried. During the year 1842 or '43 they moved into the then wilds of Michigan, coming with an ox team from Ohio, and settled in the township of Vevay, where she has been a continuous resident for more than a half century. Since the death of her husband which occurred in 1860, she has found a home with her son, who is the sole survivor of a family of seven children. The funeral services were held at the residence on Sunday last at 2 p.m., Rev. E. H. **Brockway** officiating. She was buried beside her husband in the Hawley cemetery. An incident which occurred soon after the family came to Michigan serves to show that she was a woman of remarkable physical endurance and nerve. One of the oxen of the team above referred to, while pasturing on the creek flats got into the mire and died. Soon after the mate was missing and diligent search and inquiry failed to find him. After a time a letter from their old home in Ohio said the ox had returned there. Mrs. **Quarry** persuaded her husband that if he would remain at home and care for the children she would make the trip to Ohio and drive the ox home. She returned to Ohio, made a deal for a steer to mate the ox, also a heifer for a cow and with a little help the first few miles, she drove the three head alone through the wood from Ohio to their home in Michigan. She used to tell many reminiscences of those early days in a most entertaining manner.

Albert **Odell** cannot keep out of trouble for any great length of time. Last Friday he was fined \$3.88 by Justice **Dolan** of Lansing for being drunk and disorderly, with the alternative of 10 days in the county jail. The people of Mason and Ingham county will be much better off if this man could be disposed of with a long term of imprisonment. He is thoroughly depraved and there is hardly a crime upon the statutes that he has not committed.

Wilber M. **McCrossen**, our popular druggist, will join the ranks of the benedicts today. This afternoon at five o'clock he will be married to Miss Emma **Bertch** at the residence of her mother, Mrs. L. **Bertch**, in Bay City. Mr. **McCrossen** has rented the Dr. **Green** house on Oak street, which has been thoroughly fitted and furnished for the reception of his bride, where they will be at home after March 1<sup>st</sup>. The Democrat unites with the residents of our fair city and extends a hearty greeting to Mrs. **McCrossen** to our midst. We know she will find Mason a pleasant city for her future residence

## Notes from the Librarian's Corner

Summer is here! Vacations are an important part of the summer and everyone has been thinking about summer vacation since last Christmas. There are thoughts about where to go and what types of activities there are for the family to take part in while on vacation. There are thoughts about the beach and maybe an amusement park or a State Fair. Invitations to weddings, graduations and family reunions have arrived and people are trying to decide how they can include the family gatherings into the "fun" plans of vacation. Kids are out of school and parents are trying to find activities to keep them busy when they begin to whine "I'm bored!" I have an idea. Do you have some pictures of family members that you could share with the kids and encourage them to be the family detectives by doing some Genealogy Research this summer? It might be a fun way for them to design a notebook that they could use to organize their research. Then you might encourage them to practice their writing skills by sending letters to other family members asking about information for their Family Tree. The responses they receive would give them practice in reading and comprehension of the material provided to them. They could use their math skills to find out how old a person was, how long they lived in a certain place or how far they traveled when they moved to a new location. Kids could learn how to read a map by locating where their ancestor lived in relation to where they live now. They could place the picture and all of the information they were able to gather about their ancestors into their special notebook and then share it with others. In the process, they have continued to use their art, reading, writing and math skills throughout the summer.

Now that you have the kids excited about creating their special album, have you ever thought about including some genealogy into a family vacation? A trip to a Great Lake or an Ocean might include the family reunion or a wedding where the opportunity to talk to relatives would be priceless. You could explore the local area where your ancestors lived and maybe enjoy some of the same places and activities they did when they lived there. If there is a local Genealogy Society or Reference Library available, a trip there could lead to conversations about your ancestors.

Such is the case for several of the visitors to our own local Genealogy Reference Room recently. We have had visitors come from areas near here and from as far away as California and Arizona. They had each found a clue regarding an ancestor from our area. So they decided their vacation would include a visit to our area so that they could search for more answers to the questions about their family. Also, our Membership Roster includes many people that live out of our area. Summertime is a great time for family reunions and maybe some of these members might be inclined to visit us while on a vacation that includes a family reunion. With all of these thoughts 'rolling around' in my head, I decided to share with all of you what some people would refer to as the 'housekeeping rules' and the 'where to find it' guide for our Research Room.

The Ingham County Genealogical Society Reference Room is located at the Mason Public Library (145 West Ash Street, Mason, Michigan 48854 - for those using a GPS unit.) At this time, the Reference Room is open with volunteers to assist you from 12:00 p.m. (noon) to 4:00 p.m. on Wednesdays. (However, **If you are a current Ingham County Genealogical Society member, you are eligible to use the Reference Room any time the library is open.** The library hours are Monday through Thursday from 11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., Friday from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. The library is closed on Sunday from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend and on Holidays. As a Society member you may request access to the Reference Room at the front desk of the Library by showing them your valid Society I.D. card and they will unlock the room for you or loan you the key. We ask that you lock the room when you leave and return the key to the front desk on the main floor.) The Reference Room is located on the second floor of the Library through the archway in the back of the room. As you enter the archway you will see two doors. The door to the right leads to the Newspaper Room. The Newspaper Room contains bound volumes of the old newspapers and a table to set the volumes on as you read.

As you enter the door on the left, try to envision a square which will represent the “layout” of this room. The top of the square (which will be the wall straight ahead of you as you enter the room) will be designated the **North Wall**. Hopefully, this vision you have will allow me to map out for you the location of information you will find within this room.

**The North Wall** - The Card File (Recipe Box) with the Society Members Names and the families they are researching. There are also small file drawers that have cards containing information on where to find information on People, Places and Things within our Library such as Ancestry Charts, Family Files, Subject Files on Important Events or Places in our area. There is also a computer which we can use to access the digital copies of the newspapers (up to 1934) and a microfiche Reader for use with any of the microfilm we have available for viewing. (Our library computer does not have internet access. However, if you bring your personal computer and your access card, you may be able to use Wi-Fi to connect to the internet at the library.)

**The East Wall** - Bookcases with miscellaneous books including Men of Progress of Michigan, The Life and Times of Stevens Thomson Mason - The Boy Governor of Michigan and Michigan Railroads. Jewett Funeral Home Records 1930-1986, Maple Grove Cemetery Grave Site Locations, Meridian (including the Meridian Twp. Burial Transit Permits), Onondaga, Stockbridge and Stockbridge Twp., Vevay, Webberville, Wheatfield, White Oak, and Williamston Township information. The Mason High School Yearbooks are located in a small bookcase under the window (which overlooks the parking lot). Above the bookcases are reels of microfilm for the Ingham County News from 1935 to 1969 and also the Stockbridge Brief Sun.

**The South Wall** - The 4 drawer filing cabinet (referred to as the VF - vertical file) which contains folders about Families, Schools and Photos. The bookcase next to the file cabinet contains The Burial Transit Permits for Maple Grove Cemetery from 1932 to 2005, Alaiedon, Aurelius, Bunkerhill, Delhi, East Lansing, Dansville and Ingham Twp., Lansing, Leslie and Locke Township information.

**The West Wall** - (is indented to allow for the entryway) -The portion of this wall that backs up to the entryway has a double bookcase. The right side of this bookcase contains Family Histories that have been donated to the Reference Room by fellow Researchers. There are also many other materials on the left side of the bookcase which include The Michigan Cemetery Atlas, some genealogical material for surrounding counties, an Index to the 1870 Michigan Census and the 1790 New York Federal Census. The West Wall that backs up to the Friends Book Sale Room contains many binders filed with local newspaper clippings containing listings for Marriage Licenses, Engagements, Weddings, Anniversary, Birth and Divorce Announcements, Special Birthday Announcements and Obituaries. We also have many various reference materials including The History of Ingham and Eaton Counties, Pioneer History of Ingham County, Past and Present of Ingham County, Southeast Michigan Pioneer Families of Ingham County, First Landowners of Ingham County, Plat maps, and The Honor Roll of World War I Soldiers of Ingham County.

I invite all of you to come visit our Reference Room and explore the wealth of information that is available within our small area. I hope that this “map” and the general information about our facility will enable you to find the information you seek as you continue your research on your own Family Tree. I Hope to see you soon.

## **Michigan Council Update**

State Budget / Historical & Genealogical resources

June 10, 2011

Dear genealogist,

The Michigan Legislature has completed their work on a budget and sent to the Governor, where it awaits his signature.

Funding for operations at the Library of Michigan (LM) remains almost unchanged from 2010-11 levels. This is good news, since recent budgets have cut LM operations severely. The new budget calls for a total staff of 33 full time equated positions.

The budget retains two boilerplate items that were introduced with the 2010-11 budget. One requires LM and the component programs currently within LM shall remain in state government. The second requires Michigan Department of Education (MDE) and LM to maintain custody of the non-Michigan genealogy and all Michigan specific collections. This section includes the stipulation these collections shall continue to be made available to the public.

Funding for our district, local, and neighborhood libraries otherwise known as State Aid to Libraries budgeted at \$5.4 million in the MDE budget. The School Aid budget calls for \$1.3 million for State Aid to Libraries. This is a total of \$6.75 million for State Aid to Libraries, or about \$500K less than 2010-11. The legislature restored almost all of this funding; the Governor's budget called for a reduction of \$3.8 million for State Aid to Libraries. Also in the MDE budget is a separate item for the Michigan eLibrary (MeL) at \$950K. This is in anticipation of a reduction of federal funding for MeL. With the additional funding for MeL, state spending for our local libraries will slightly increase for 2011-12.

Historical administration and services now has its own section of the Department of Natural Resources budget with \$3.96 million, and 36 full time equated employees. The Archives of Michigan is funded with an additional \$800K and eight full time equated employees

MeL (<http://mel.org>) is the statewide portal for a wealth of content Michigan residents are able to access from home on our personal computers. Heritage Quest Online is one of the most popular MeL databases used by genealogists and historians. MeL is available for home use to all Michigan residents. Even if you are visiting Florida, Arizona, or elsewhere, all you need is to enter your library card or Michigan Driver's license number for access.

SeekingMichigan.org continues to be a fantastic resource for the lovers of history. This continues to be a joint project between the Archives of Michigan and the Library of Michigan. There is also a subset of SeekingMichigan.org for Civil War documents, photos, and materials; even an event calendar at <http://micivilwar.org>.

We urge you to continue to use these valuable resources in your research. The Archives of Michigan remains fully committed to serving the historical and genealogical community. The Archives is open Mon. – Fri. 1 p.m. – 5 p.m. <http://michigan.gov/archivesofmi>. The Abrams Genealogy Collection and Michigan Collection at the LM continue to be one of the finest historical and genealogical collections in the Midwest. LM remains open and their collections are available for researchers. The hours are: Mon. – Fri. 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. <http://michigan.gov/libraryofmichigan> or <http://michigan.gov/familyhistory>. LM is committed to growing and collecting materials about Michigan for the Michigan Collection. Both the Archives and Library are closed on government holidays. If you are planning a trip to Lansing to use these collections, please check their websites for the most recent hours and holiday closings.

One of the largest threats to these valuable resources is lack of use. Please continue to utilize and encourage others to use the Library and Archives of Michigan, both located at the Michigan Library and Historical Center in Lansing.
